Hanover Park Public Safety Officers Deployed to Assist With Hurricane Katrina Disaster Relief Efforts

All of us have watched with a sense of horror and disbelief as Hurricane Katrina ravaged the Gulf Coast, leaving death and destruction not seen since the Civil War in her wake.

Everyone wants to help. So when the request from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) came, asking for 2,000 firefighters from United States metropolitan areas to go to the Gulf Coast region, "Seventeen of our 32 full time firefighters were ready to go on a moment's notice," said Fire Chief Craig Haigh. Two were chosen: Firefighter/Paramedics Rick Herzog and Brandon Matheny. Herzog and Matheny were chosen based on their experience, personality and qualifications. They will serve in the hurricane ravaged area for 30 days.

Over the weekend of September 16, two additional Hanover Park firefighters left for the Gulf Coast. Firefighter Garrett Kody and Lt. Jim Larsen will serve in the area until early October.

"Every member of the Hanover Park Police Department's Crisis Resolution Team volunteered to go," said Police Chief Ron Moser. Patrol Officers Steven Stotz and Jennifer Smith were selected to represent Hanover Park. They left on September 16 and are scheduled to return October 1.

Hanover Park is extremely proud of its public safety officers and their commitment to helping others in need.

Reaching Out to Hurricane Katrina Victims: Here's How You Can Help

Hanover Park is a drop off point for donations to be sent to areas affected by Hurricane Katrina. The Northern Illinois Food Bank, a member of American's Second Harvest—The Nation's Food Bank Network, is coordinating the collection.

Food and grocery items that are needed include:

- ▲ Bottled water and gallons of water (no glass)
- ▲ Single serving snacks such as cereal and energy bars
- ▲ Pop Tarts
- ▲ Nutrition Bars
- ▲ Non-refrigerated nutrition drinks such as Success or Slim Fast
- ▲ Peanut butter
- ▲ Heat and eat foods such as chili, stews, canned soups, canned vegetables, and canned meats like Spam, corned beef, and sausages
- ▲ Lunchables or other single serving foods that do not require refrigeration
- ▲ Meal replacement entrees
- ▲ Paper goods such as plates, napkins, cups, tissues, and diapers.

Minute with the Mayor . . .

“Faster than a speeding train” is a phrase we’re all familiar with, but every year dozens of foolish children and unthinking adults find out too late that a speeding train is fast, indeed. Fast enough to seem to appear out of nowhere as you walk along the tracks or try to beat a train across the tracks. So here are some important reminders to keep you safe around trains, train tracks, and train stations.

- o Never take a shortcut across tracks. The railroad right-of-way is private property. Cross only at designated railroad crossings.
- o Look both ways before crossing tracks at outlying train stations and grade crossings-even if the warning devices are not activated. If warning devices activate as you approach a crossing, do not rush across the tracks.
- o Stand at a safe distance from the tracks when warning devices are activated, as trains may extend three feet or more outside the rails.
- o Do not cross the tracks immediately after a train passes, as another train may be approaching on adjacent tracks. Wait until there is a clear view in both directions.
- o Remember there is a gap between the tracks and crosswalk areas. Avoid stepping on them and walk bikes across.
- o Freight trains do not travel on predictable schedules; schedules for passenger trains can change.
- o Never walk down train tracks it is illegal and dangerous.
- o Trains can be very quiet. Stereo headphones should not be worn near railroad tracks. They will prevent you from hearing an oncoming train. Don’t be caught off guard, as trains cannot stop quickly. **Look, Listen and Live!**

Throwing rocks or placing objects on the track is dangerous and against the law. Objects of any size, even small debris on the track, can be propelled from the steel wheel with the force of a bullet, injuring those standing nearby. Larger objects can cause a train derailment, injuring or killing passengers and crew members.

Six Smart Tips for Saving Gas and Money

The price of gasoline today has all of us thinking about ways to spend less at the gas pump. Here's a double bonus: you can save money and reduce air pollution at the same time by modifying the way you drive.

- ▲ Avoid jack-rabbit starts and sudden stops. These use fuel at a much higher rate than easy accelerations and steady stops.
- ▲ Combine errands and carpool. Short trips can eat up fuel because engines become most efficient after they have warmed up.
- ▲ Reduce engine idling. For any stop that you expect to last more than a minute or two, shut off your engine rather than letting it idle. Don't bother warming up your engine if it's not necessary.
- ▲ Keep your tires properly inflated. Under-inflated tires cause fuel consumption to increase by 6%.
- ▲ Watch your speed. The faster you drive, the more fuel you use. Driving at 65 miles per hour, rather than 55 miles per hour, increases fuel consumption by 20%.
- ▲ Remove extra weight. Avoid carrying unneeded items, especially heavy ones. An extra 100 pounds in the trunk reduces a typical car's fuel economy by 1 to 2%.

Using these tips will help us all breathe easier and save money in the process.

Could the Trees on Your Property Survive a Storm?

Solid as an oak, strong and unyielding in the wind, reaching for the sky describes trees of strength, size and longevity. However, unmanaged trees can fail in severe weather. That's why the Village of Hanover Park Forestry Division performs annual inspections to check for improperly growing branches, broken branches or damaged main trunk, poor structure or rotting, which can weaken a tree. Every parkway tree is trimmed every three to seven years depending on their size, class and/or location.

Parkway or public trees are not the only trees that need scheduled maintenance and proper trimming. During last July's wind storm, numerous trees on private property came crashing down, causing major damage to homes, vehicles, power and telephone lines. A closer inspection revealed that the vast majority of failed trees and branches were due to little or no maintenance (trees that were not pruned or trimmed while they were growing and/or inspected on a scheduled basis). In contrast, only branches were lost from parkway and public trees that received scheduled maintenance. Proper tree trimming helps ensure the safety of your and your neighbor's property and the health of your trees.

The fall season is a good time to inspect all the trees in your yard. Pay special attention to trees close to your home or near any structures that may be targets for trees (either your home or your neighbor's home). If the trees in your yard are taller than your house and have not been trimmed for more than seven years, they are more likely to fail in a windstorm, hard rain, or ice storms. Large trees between homes or next to driveways should be checked especially carefully for potentially hazardous conditions. We strongly recommend calling a tree expert or a certified arborist to inspect the trees, remove branches and prune as necessary to reduce the chance of tree failure as well as to keep trees healthy and property safe. In some cases a tree expert may suggest the removal of a tree for safety reasons.

Officials Break Ground for New Library

Big plans are underway for the Hanover Park Branch Library, which will have a new home next year just down the road from its current site.



Senator John Millner, President Bock, Schaumburg Library Trustees and Elected Officials participated in the groundbreaking.

Ground was broken on August 21 for the new facility at 1266 Irving Park Road, and construction has begun. With 9,263 square feet, the building will provide more than 2,600 square feet for the adult area, 1,600 square feet for youth services and 618 square feet for teens. Tables, lounge areas, computers, a 50-seat meeting room and quiet adult reading room with a fireplace will also be included.

For full time firefighter/paramedic positions, a Firefighter II Certification is required. Applicants must also have an EMT-Paramedic license or be currently enrolled in a paramedic course approved by the Village's EMS Resource Hospital (Sherman Hospital in Elgin, IL) by date of hire.

The selection process includes an orientation, physical agility exam, written exam, background investigation, oral interviews, psychological exam, polygraph, and a medical exam.

What to Do – And Not to Do – When You Rake and Dispose of Leaves This Fall

Autumn, although beautiful, requires leaf disposal. Leaves generated from parkway trees in public streets are collected by Village crews. Trees and leaves on private property are the homeowner's responsibility.

Depositing leaves on public property is prohibited. Violators face a minimum \$100 fine. Raking leaves into streets strains Village street-sweeping efforts. Vast quantities of leaves in the street also increase the potential for flooding because storm sewer inlets become clogged. Residents can choose from three options to properly dispose of leaves:



1. Create a backyard composting area
2. Mulch leaves by running over them with a lawn mower (you may wish to use the mulch for landscaping purposes, such as around shrubs); or
3. Place leaves in a yardwaste container, attach a yardwaste sticker (\$1.81 per sticker), and have them collected by Allied. If you have a scavenger other than Allied, please contact them for yardwaste collection information.

The Village recommends options #1 and #2. The escalating cost of disposing of leaves at a landscape waste facility is greater than disposing of garbage at a landfill.

BFI's final yardwaste collection day is Saturday, November 26, 2005.

Sump Pumps Now Required to Discharge 5 Feet from Lot Line

The Village Board recently approved a new regulation regarding the discharge of water from sump pumps.

Section 18-92(r) was added to the Hanover Park Municipal Code to provide that any new or existing sump pump shall not discharge water closer than 5 feet from any lot line. Residents are asked to check their sump pump discharge line and move it at least 5 feet back from any lot line. This regulation allows more water to soak into the yard prior to entering a drainage swale and reducing the chance it would become a nuisance on an adjoining property.

Helpful Hints for a Safe & Happy Halloween

Help keep your favorite ghosts and goblins safe this Halloween by reviewing these important safety rules with your children.

- ❑ NO candy should be eaten until it has been inspected by an adult.
- ❑ Discard any unwrapped items.
- ❑ Check all food wrappers for signs of tampering.
- ❑ Keep costumes simple. Costumes should be made of light, brightly colored or reflective material, so that your trick-or-treater can be easily seen at night. Costumes should not restrict either vision or movement.
- ❑ At least one person in the group should carry a flashlight while trick or treating.
- ❑ Trick or treat in groups whenever possible, accompanied by one or more adults.
- ❑ Instruct your children not to enter any home, and don't invite anyone else's child into your home.
- ❑ For safety's sake, trick or treat only at homes in your own neighborhood.
- ❑ Remind children to cross only at corners and to look both ways before crossing the street. Children should use sidewalks whenever possible, obey traffic lights, and walk – never run – across streets.



Change Your Clock, Change Your Smoke Detector Batteries

Daylight savings time is going to change back to standard time at 2:00 AM on Sunday, October 30th. That's also the date that you need to make another change – a change that could save your life – by changing the batteries in your smoke detectors.

Nonworking smoke detectors disarm residents of the protective benefits which home fire safety devices were designed to provide. The most commonly-cited cause of nonworking smoke detectors: dead or missing batteries! Approximately 900 children die each year in home fires, and 80% of those deaths occur in homes without working smoke detectors.

Changing smoke detector batteries at least once a year is one of the simplest, most effective ways to reduce these tragic deaths or injuries. In fact, working smoke detectors reduce the risk of death or injury in home fires by nearly 50%.

The “Change your clock, change your battery” campaign urges you to change smoke detector batteries when changing clocks back to standard time each fall, this year on October 30th. It's a change that could save your life!

Take time to ensure your home is fire hazard safe.

- Don't allow junk items to accumulate.
- Remember to store boxes away from heat sources
- Recycle old newspapers, books, magazines.
- Store flammable liquids outside your home in well ventilated areas and always in approved safety containers.
- Electrical safety around your home means never overloading circuits or outlets, using extension cords with the proper rating for the job, and replacing old worn out cords immediately.

If the residence has a smoke detector that is not functioning, or if there is no smoke detector at all, the residents will be given a new smoke detector from the
