Village Board Adopts 2017 Annual Budget

On December 1, 2016, the Village Board approved the Fiscal Year 2017 Annual Budget, which establishes authorized expenditures and sources of revenues from January 1, 2017 through December 31, 2017. The Budget was approved with a 0% (zero percent) property tax increase while maintaining Village services at the levels residents have come to expect. Despite continued economic challenges, most notably the financial uncertainty facing the State of Illinois, the Village enters FY2017 on stable financial footing.

This budget document is in response to the needs of the citizens and business community of Hanover Park, and is designed to provide a comprehensive overview of the Village's financial activities during the next twelve months. It is a balanced budget that meets the Village's fund balance policies, and all current levels of service are well maintained. The Fiscal Year 2017 budget also reflects the Village's efforts to diversify revenues.

"Hanover Park continues its long tradition of delivering a balanced budget for Board approval. I appreciate the willingness of staff to continue to be frugal and mindful of the state of the economy, while still being sensitive to the needs of the residents, and providing high quality services." said Village President Rodney Craig.

Notice of Village Ordinance Amendment - Trees on Public and Private Property

The Village Board recently adopted an amendment to Chapter 102 of the Code of Ordinances regarding dead, dangerous, or diseased trees on private and public property. Residents should be aware of the following:

- Dead, dangerous, or diseased trees must be removed from public or private property.
- Trees or shrubs that overhang sidewalks, streets, or public places which impede or interfere with traffic or travel on public places must be trimmed, as well as limbs or shrubs that have become likely to fall onto or across any public way.
- Upon receipt of notice, property owners will have 30 days to remove the tree or shrub. Failure to do so may result in a fine of not less than \$250 nor more than \$1,500, and each day a violation continues shall be considered a separate violation. Also, the Village may remove the tree or shrub at the property owner's expense.



Dead, dangerous, or diseased trees not only pose a safety and health risk to our community, but they also negatively impact its overall appearance. We encourage residents and property owners throughout the Village to work with us to keep Hanover Park safe and beautiful! Questions or concerns? How Much is Too Much?

The holidays are upon us again; time for parties, gift-giving and eating! It's easy to get carried away in the spirit of the season. I know I'm always a few pounds heavier after eating all those Christmas cookies! Some people tend to drink more alcohol this time of year. That's not too unusual considering most of us attend more social gatherings around the holidays than we normally do. But how much is too much?

It's not always easy to see when your drinking has crossed the line from social use to problem drinking. You have to examine how alcohol affects you. If your drinking is causing problems in your life, you have a drinking problem. Ask yourself if your drinking causes you to neglect your responsibilities at home or work, creates legal or financial problems, drives a wedge between you and your loved ones, or becomes a way for you to cope with stress. These are all symptoms of alcohol abuse. Not all alcohol abusers will become full-blown alcoholics, but it is a big risk factor. Sometimes alcoholism develops suddenly in response to a stressor and other times it creeps up on you as your tolerance for alcohol increases. The time to get help is now, before you become dependent on alcohol.

Denial is one of the biggest obstacles to getting help. Denial keeps us from looking honestly at our behavior and its negative effects. You may rationalize your drinking habits, blame others for your problems or refuse to discuss the subject. Ask yourself why you are so defensive. The honest answer might be that you have lost control over your drinking and need help to get back on track.

If you're ready to admit you have a drinking problem, you're ready to take the first step. Reaching out for help is the second step. Hanover Park Police Department Earns National Accreditation

On Saturday, November 5, 2016, the Hanover Park Police Department was formally presented with its reaccreditation award from the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies (CALEA). CALEA is a credentialing authority whose mission is to accredit public safety agencies who are found to be in compliance with an established set of professional standards and consistently demonstrate excellence in their policies, procedures, and practices.

The award is the fifth such reaccreditation for the department, and was presented with Meritorious Designation, which recognizes agencies with at least 15 years of continuous accreditation with the standards. Hanover Park received its first accreditation in 2001. Additionally, the Hanover Park Police Department's reaccreditation was presented 'With Excellence,' a distinction reserved for agencies who comply with at least 90 percent of optional standards in addition to 100 percent of the mandatory standards.

The Hanover Park Police Department is one of only 50 accredited police agencies in Illinois, and one of only 821 in the nation to receive this designation.

Did you know that today, if your home broke out in fire, you would have less than three minutes to escape safely? But luckily, the simple action of closing your bedroom door before going to sleep can help slow the spread of smoke, heat and fire.



- **Check Your Smoke Alarms:** Having interconnected smoke alarms inside and outside of every sleeping area and on every level of your home is a must. Test them regularly and replace them as needed.
- **Make an Escape Plan:** Too many families don't have a fire escape plan. Make sure everyone in your family knows what to do in a fire before there is a fire.
- **Create a Safety Checklist:** From installing carbon monoxide alarms to inspecting your electrical cords, there's a lot to keep in check. This list makes it easy.
- **Don't Wait, Check the Date:** Smoke alarms need to be replaced every 10 years. Find out if it's time to replace yours.

The HeartSaver/AED course is designed to teach CPR, the use of an Automatic External Defibrillator (AED), and what to do in the event of a choking emergency for victims of all ages. This course is designed for those that are expected to help in the event of an emergency in the workplace. This class is also highly recommended for new parents, babysitters, and anyone that wishes to help in the event of an emergency. This class follows the recommendations set by the American Heart Association.

The Healthcare Provider CPR course is intended for HealthCare professionals that work both in and out of a hospital setting, EMT students, nursing school students, childcare/daycare facility employees and DCFS participants. This class meets the requirements set by the American Heart Association, and is required to maintain most Professional Medical Licenses.

2016 Environmental Committee Highlights

The Environmental Committee accomplished the following projects this past year:

- Participated in the Annual DuPage River Sweep. A stretch of the West Branch of the DuPage River both upstream and downstream of the bridge near the intersection of Arlington and Greenbrook Boulevard, is Hanover Park's "Adopt-a-Stream" segment. Approximately 900 lbs. of garbage was collected.
- Conducted an annual Inlet Stenciling which consists of stenciling the words "Dump No Waste, Drains to River" on storm inlets. This year the inlets around Celebrity Circle were done after the resurfacing was completed.
- Held a family-friendly Open House at the Hanover Park Community Apiary. Beekeepers answered questions about this fun and increasingly vital hobby.
- Worked with Hanover Highlands School to establish a rain garden using plants from the Conservation Foundation. We also planted two pear trees and two cherry trees, which are educational to students, and serve as a source of healthful food items.
- Conducted the Eighth Annual Recycling Event with great success on September 24th, at the Commuter Lot. Over 300 people brought goods for recycling or donation.
- Continue to recycle holiday lights. Bring your inoperative strings of holiday lights to the Public Works facility for recycling, rather than discarding them in the trash.

Vactor Sewer Cleaning and Excavation

Have you seen this truck in your neighborhood? It is a very good thing that it is there.

The Village is responsible for providing a system for efficiently moving both wastewater (sewage) and storm water through two separate collection systems, from the source to an environmentally safe place for treatment and disposal. A wastewater collection system is a network of pipes, manholes, cleanouts, lift stations, and other structures to collect all the wastewater from an area and transport it to a treatment plant. Obstructions can occur in the pipe such as roots, grease, debris, a broken pipe, or a joint failure are introduced. Partial or complete interruption of the flow will backup and eventually overflow the system up to the point of coming up into the lowest drains in the system. This is often a basement.



The best way to keep a sewer or storm system working properly is to perform routine inspection and cleaning. The Village uses a combination sewer vacuum/jetter which combines high-pressure water jetting and a high-flow vacuum source to clean out small obstructions before they ever reach a point where you might notice a backup in your home. The machine scours the pipes clean, then vacuums up the material to restore and maintain normal sewer flow. The Village has a very aggressive sewer cleaning program. It may not prevent every backup in every situation, but it prevents many backups and helps restore the sewer system to working order more quickly.

The Vacuum/Jetter is also used for vacuum excavating. This consists of using high-pressure water to break up and cut the soil, while a high-flow vacuum system lifts the soil up and out of the excavation area. This process is mainly used when there are a lot of utilities in an area that could possibly be damaged if a backhoe were being used. Essentially it turns the dirt into a loose mud and sucks it up like a shop-vac rather than digging. It doesn't work in all conditions, but when we need it, it helps us make repairs faster and keep the crews safer.

Your Public Works Department works around the clock to help the residents and businesses of Hanover Park. You may only see us during winter plowing operations, but we're there year round to keep your water drinkable, roads safe, sewage treated, trees trimmed, signs visible, and snow plowed – among many other things. You can always feel free to call us at 630-823-5700 and ask for T. J. Moore, Director of Engineering and Public Works, if you have a concern, complaint, or even to compliment an employee.

Holiday Lights Reminder

Code Enforcement would like to remind you that pursuant to Village Code 30-1 (590.3B), holiday lights must be taken down within 90 days of the holiday (which is April 1st).

Parking After Snowfall

Per to Village Code, Section 62-11-1323 (limited parking for snow removal), it shall be unlawful to park any vehicle on any public street in the Village at any time within 24 hours after a snowfall of two inches or more has occurred, except on those streets where late night parking is permitted in Section 62-11-1327(b), that within 24 hours after a snowfall of two or more inches vehicles shall be parked only on the side of the street on the day during which late night parking is permitted.

Village Partners with DuPage Habitat for Humanity for Neighborhood Revitalization

The Village of Hanover Park has partnered with the DuPage Habitat for Humanity and Keeneyville School District 20, to revitalize the Greenbrook-Tanglewood neighborhood. Several community partners, such as schools, churches, banks, Park District, Forest Preserve District, and social organizations are collaborating to assemble resources, organize residents and revitalize the neighborhood in a holistic approach.

Four subcommittees – Housing, Jobs & Economic Development, Education and Community Outreach, and Clean Up/Green Up – have begun meeting regularly for this grass-roots effort, following intense resident outreach. Volunteers, including Lake Park High School students, helped with aesthetic improvements. A homeownership workshop has been held to assist renters contemplating home ownership. 


**General Fund Budget

\$32,843,228**




**General Fund Budget

\$61,142,856**






Police Department 2017 Area Response Team (ART) Meetings
