As we are all continuing to adjust to our “new normal”, I encourage you to continue to follow the 3 W’s: **W**ear a mask; **W**atch your distance; **W**ash your hands. These simple precautions will help us get through this pandemic and get us back to our regular way of living much quicker. Kids are returning to school with adjusted schedules, remote learning environments or a hybrid schedule, and it is important to continue to stress COVID safety with our young ones. Thank you to our dedicated principals, teachers and support staff for working together to come up with a plan to keep our children safe during this pandemic. 2020 has been a challenging year, but Hanover Park will persevere!

During the civil unrest we have been experiencing across our country, the Village of Hanover Park continues to demonstrate our commitment to diversity and quality policing. We continue to examine and discuss our Police Department’s policies and practices at townhall events, Village Board Workshops, and Village Board meetings. We want to ensure that our Police Department is employing practices and policies that are fair and equitable for all. The Police Department is accredited by the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies (CALEA) which requires the Police Department to review their policies and practices on an ongoing basis. This accreditation requires our department to adhere to contemporary best practices and policies and as a result, we have found that our Police Department already employs many of the proposed policy changes being discussed, including all of the policies recommended in the **#8CANTWAIT** campaign. I would like to invite you to participate in **“Move with the Mayor - Hanover Park.”** This initiative is supported by the U.S. Conference of Mayors (USCM) and the U.S. Surgeon General’s Call to Action to Promote Walking and Walkable Communities. Move with the Mayor™ (MWTM) is part of a national movement to promote strategies that work to get 27 million Americans more physically active by 2027. Sign up for Hanover Park’s Challenge Team and compete with other cities based on average step counts for the team. Prizes are available for the top Hanover Park participants. The Village of Hanover Park is proud to announce that back on July 31st, the Village’s response rate to the 2020 Census rose to 73.6% and surpassed the final response rate for the 2010 Census. As of the printing of this issue of the Hi-Lighter, we have passed the 75% response rate. This is a great news because you still have until **September 30th to respond** to the census and get Hanover Park closer to a complete count of all residents.

There are many reasons why the census is important but a major funding issue is that the state of Illinois loses \$1,400 for every person not counted. This directly effects the quality of life in Hanover Park. **Please complete the 2020 Census online at www.my2020census.gov, by phone, or by mail.**

Finally, it continues to be my pleasure to represent the people of Hanover Park, our hometown. We cannot do it without you! Take time to volunteer and give back to our wonderful town, at the schools, churches or assisting on the playing field. We are a Village that believes all youth will have hope and achieve success without exception. Together we are finding ways to believe in our youth and together we can make a difference in Hanover Park!

Hanover Park Celebrates its 10th Anniversary with its Sister City Valparaiso

September 7, 2020, marks the tenth anniversary of the signing of the Sister Cities agreement between Hanover Park and Valparaiso, Zacatecas, Mexico. The agreement was signed when a Hanover Park delegation traveled to Valparaiso. The Hanover Park delegation consisted of Village President Rodney S. Craig, Village Clerk Eira Corral Sepulveda, then-Sister Cities Committee Chair Linda McCance Packham, and Sister Cities Committee Members Arnulfo Flores, Maria Pineda and Gustavo Pineda.

Since that time, the Village of Hanover Park has enjoyed a number of interesting and rewarding exchanges with Valparaiso residents, students and municipal leadership during their visits to Chicagoland. Activities have included the hosting of receptions and tours of the Village, coordination of a pen pal letter exchange, presentation of scholarships to the Jesus Gonzales Ortega School, attendance at the annual Zacatecas Festival (Maywood), and assistance with the collection of sports equipment and athletic wear for distribution in Valparaiso.

Locally, members of the Hanover Park Sister Cities Committee participate in the annual Mexican Independence celebration by marching and riding in the parade procession sponsored by St. Ansgar Church.

This special anniversary will be recognized with the reading of a proclamation at a Village Board meeting in September.

Investing in Our Community

Hanover Park saw residents and businesses continue to invest in our community – a laudable effort especially during these trying times. Thank you to our residents that helped support the local economy by shopping at Hanover Park businesses! Thank you to our businesses that invested in making improvements and navigated these last few months by promptly adapting to changing consumer habits. So many of our businesses modified their practices, changed hours, offered carry-out/delivery, and remained open to serve our residents. We hope you have had a chance to enjoy outdoor dining, now offered at several of our local restaurants.

The Village of Hanover Park continued providing services and staff worked hard through the COVID pandemic going above and beyond 'regular' duties.

A huge shout out goes to our Village Board of Trustees, for approving a Business Assistance Program, whereby signs were provided to our businesses free of cost to let consumers know they were open. Assistance is also in progress for helping businesses with online marketing, also free of cost, so as to help sustain and grow their sales.

Development moved forward! Menards continues expansion of its warehouse and soon, we will see a public amenity at the corner of Kingsbury and Irving Park Rd. The Verandah Senior Housing now has new families in the finished townhomes, and more units are under construction. Habitat for Humanity continues to make a positive impact in the Greenbrook Tanglewood neighborhood with the construction of new townhomes and helping many families through the Neighborhood Revitalization Coalition.



A new development was approved for the large vacant site at the NW corner of Lake St. and Gary Avenue. The site is being prepared for a mixed-use development with industrial and commercial uses at this gateway location. A new application is under review for a 3-lot subdivision for commercial development at the Northeast corner of Lake and Bartels. The Village Center Streetscape project is moving forward as well with overhead utility lines being buried. The well-designed Ontarioville Plaza will be next, with landscaping along Devon Avenue and addition of many elements for pedestrian comfort for future community events in the new downtown!

Summer capital projects have also continued during the COVID pandemic. Reconstruction is underway on Hollywood Ave, Jonquil Terrace, Thornwood Street, Rosewood Street, Hanover Street and Jasmine Drive. The paving and watermain on Countryside Drive has also been completed. In addition, the Village has also been active in patching this summer with a new patching program.

U.S. Taekwondo Academy is a martial arts school that has a unique Afterschool Program for students lead by Master Lu Garibay – Director of Martial Arts. A combination of taekwondo instruction with their afterschool program teaches the values and 5 tenants of taekwondo: etiquette, humility, wisdom, sincerity and righteousness – all at an affordable price. Students will learn forms and techniques that will lead them on a journey from White Belt to Black Belt.

How it works: Afterschool, students are picked up from local elementary schools and brought back to the Academy where they receive help with homework, eat a parent-approved snack and then proceed to their taekwondo class. There they are taught forms, kicks, and punches along with anti-bullying techniques that can help keep them safe and build self-confidence.

The Academy also offers seasonal camps which are full or half days of "electronics free" fun including field trips, art, science and music. Enjoy a Parents Night Out while your child watches a movie and plays games with other students in a safe environment. Self-Defense workshops are also offered, and you can also rent space for birthday parties, family activities and meetings.

Village Hall Reopens With New Safety Procedures

On August 3rd, Hanover Park's Village Hall reopened to the public with new sanitation and safety procedures in place in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. The building has reopened with a new schedule: Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays & Fridays from 8:00 a.m.-4:30 p.m. We are closed to the public on Wednesdays to allow for a more detailed cleaning and sanitation of Village facilities.

When you arrive at Village Hall, you will see that new partitions have been installed at counters where staff and the public interact. We have also added hand sanitizer stations throughout Village Hall. All visitors are required to wear a face covering when entering Village Hall. Visitors should also remember to please practice social distancing.

New procedures are taking place at the counters at Village Hall. Only one visitor (two at the Finance Counter) will be allowed at a Village counter. Those waiting their turn must remain at the next social distancing floor marker. All visitors should practice social distancing by maintaining at least 6' of physical separation from others. Please also note that elevator usage is restricted to single occupancy.

The Village offers convenient options to pay water bills, parking violations/citations, to purchase commuter parking permits, transfer stamps and other miscellaneous bills. Residents are strongly encouraged to utilize pay online services or use the Finance Department's Drop Box located in front of Village Hall as an alternative to coming to Village Hall.

Annual Fire Hydrant Flushing



Beginning Monday, August 31 and continuing through Tuesday, September 15, the Village Water Division will be flushing hydrants throughout the Village. The flushing will occur between the hours of 6:00 AM and 2:00 PM. Signs will be posted in designated areas prior to flushing.

Residents should not wash laundry during the flushing hours as the staining of clothes may result from the rust that is stirred up during the flushing process. Residents with water softeners are encouraged to check the cycle time of their softeners so that the unit does not regenerate during this period.

Residents often ask why the Village flushes fire hydrants every year. The answer is regular hydrant flushing is a vital part of routine maintenance for the water system for these important reasons:

Improves Water Quality: Flushing removes minerals such as iron and magnesium that have collected in the water mains.

Improves Water Flow: By removing these minerals, the inside diameter of a water main is increased and therefore allows a better flow of water.

Hydrant Maintenance: A fire hydrant is a mechanical device. Operation of a hydrant lubricates internal mechanisms and gaskets.

Hydrant Inspection: Any deficiencies are noted and repaired as necessary to ensure that each hydrant will perform when needed for an emergency.

Hydrants will be flushed by area according to the following schedule:

Cook County

August 31, September 1, 2
South of Irving Park Road, North of Lake Street, West of Barrington Road

September 3, 4
South of Irving Park Road and East of Barrington Road (Hanover Highlands and Longmeadow South area)

September 7, 8, 9
North of Irving Park Road

DuPage County

August 31, September 1, 2, 3
South of DuPage County Line, North of Stearns Road

September 7, 8, 9
South of Stearns Road, North of Schick Road

September 10, 11, 14, 15
South of Schick Road

Schedule subject to change due to weather conditions or emergencies!

Electronics Recycling and Garbage Rates

The Village has approved an extension to the agreement with Groot. The pickup day will remain the same and we are excited to announce two major modifications to the agreement.

First, there will now be **FREE** electronics recycling. Residents can dispose of two electronic waste items (including televisions up to 50 lbs.) at no additional cost. Residents will be required to contact Groot and schedule collection at least 24 hours in advance of their designated service day. Televisions over 50 lbs. may be charged an additional charge of \$50.00 per unit.

The current definition of E-waste, pursuant to Illinois law, includes but may not be limited to:

Televisions, computers – desktop or laptop, computer monitors, keyboards, facsimile machines, recorders, digital music players, digital video disc players, video game consoles,

small scale servers, scanners, electronic mice, digital converters, cable receivers, satellite receivers and digital video disc recorders need to be disposed of in a manner consistent with the enacted Illinois E-Waste Act.

Secondly, for all single-family homes, duplexes, and triplexes, there will be a rate reduction from the current rate of \$25.53 per month to \$21.75 per month.

We would like to thank Groot for working with the Village to make these changes happen. We are very excited to be moving forward with a new agreement and improved services.

As Fire Prevention Week Approaches, Hanover Park Fire Department Reminds Residents: "Serve Up Fire Safety in the Kitchen!"

October 3 - 10, 2020 – The Hanover Park Fire Department is teaming up with the National Fire Protection Association® (NFPA®) – the official sponsor of Fire Prevention Week for more than 90 years – to promote this year's Fire Prevention Week campaign, "Serve Up Fire Safety in the Kitchen!" The campaign works to educate everyone about simple but important actions they can take to keep themselves and those around them safe.

According to NFPA, cooking is the leading cause of home fires and home fire injuries in the United States. Almost half (44%) of reported home fires started in the kitchen. Two-thirds (66%) of home cooking fires start with the ignition of food or other cooking materials.



The Hanover Park Fire Department encourages all residents to embrace the 2020 Fire Prevention Week theme.

"Serve Up Fire Safety in the Kitchen! is a great message and theme for this year's prevention week," said Fire Chief Haigh. "Cooking fires are the most common causes of residential fires. They can quickly grow if unattended and cause a serious amount of damage and harm. These types of fires can easily be prevented."

Hanover Park Fire Department wants to share safety tips to keep you from having a cooking fire.

- Never leave cooking food unattended. Stay in the kitchen while you are frying, grilling, or broiling. If you have to leave, even for a short time, turn off the stove.
- If you are simmering, baking, roasting, or boiling food, check it regularly, remain in the home while food is cooking, and use a timer to remind you that you are cooking.
- You have to be alert when cooking. You will not be alert if you are sleepy, have taken medicine or drugs, or consumed alcohol that makes you drowsy.
- Always keep an oven mitt and pan lid nearby when you are cooking. If a small grease fire starts, slide the lid over the pan to smother the flame. Turn off the burner, and leave the pan covered until it is completely cool.
- Have a "kid-free zone" of at least 3 feet around the stove and areas where hot food or drink is prepared or carried.

7 Steps to Firepit Safety

Picture this...a warm fire with roasted marshmallows, the weather is 75, and all of your close family and friends are with you. Yes, owning a fire pit is enjoyable, but a huge responsibility. Laying down rules and being aware of the safety hazards around them is useful for prevention of any fires or damage to your property.

- 1. Check weather** – Avoid using your fire pit on windy days, since flames or embers can spread to your home, yard and nearby trees. By checking the weather forecast ahead of time you can predict if the conditions will be right for a fire or not.
- 2. Assess area** – Before lighting the fire, check the area around you to make sure there is no debris or objects that could potentially catch on fire. This means there are no combustible materials or even loose leaves and debris around the pit to ensure fire does not spread.
- 3. Check distance** – The fire should also be set 10 to 20 feet away from objects, buildings and guests.
- 4. Have a bucket of water nearby** – Keep five gallons of water near you at all times in case a fire needs to be put out immediately.
- 5. Use the right wood** – Use wood that has been properly seasoned, meaning, not wood that has been just cut from trees. Store-bought wood from your local hardware store is a safer bet because it is made specifically for fire pit usage. The length of the logs should be less than $\frac{3}{4}$ of the diameter of the pit.
- 6. Screen** – By purchasing a screen that can be placed around the fire, you can shield any flames from spreading, and create a barrier so people know what a safe distance should be from the pit.
- 7. Dousing** – Pour water from your bucket up and down the length of the fire, then side to side. Hold the water several feet over the fire to avoid getting burned by the steam and thoroughly cover all the wood and embers until the fire stops smoking



Final Brush Pickup

The Village's final brush pickup cycle will take place during the month of October in accordance with the following schedule:

October 5

Areas 1 and 2
(Streets North of Lake Street)

October 19

Areas 3 and 4
(Streets South of Lake Street)

All branches must be out by 7:00 am on the first day of pickup for your area.

If you miss your scheduled pickup, you may put brush and branches out for pickup by Groot Industries each Friday through November 27, 2020.

All you have to do is rake your leaves, put them into a recyclable yard waste bag, and set them at the curb on your normal trash pickup day. How to Protect Our Waterways in Fall


Fall is a time for cooler days and changing leaves. However, with the fall season also comes the need for yard cleanup. In autumn, leaves are often blown or swept into storm drains and waterways and can become a source of water pollution. Once they reach waterways, leaves decompose and release phosphorous into the water, which can result in algae blooms and decreased oxygen for fish. However, pollutants are not the only problem. Leaves can also build up along curbs, gutters, and storm drains, which can lead to localized flooding. To avoid these problems, you can:

- Compost leaves and mix with other organic materials to provide nutrients necessary for fertilizing lawns.
- Use a mulching mower to chop down the leaves into small pieces and use them as mulch in the garden.
- Utilize a bagged leaf (securely sealed) collection or removal service.
