Movie Screening: Dolphin Tale Thursday, July 14 6:30-9:00 p.m.




Inspired by the amazing true story of a brave dolphin and the compassionate strangers who banded together to save her life. Swimming free, a young dolphin is caught in a crab trap,

Please celebrate safely and leave the fireworks to the professionals! I would also like to take an opportunity to congratulate the Class of 2022. You did it! I wish you all the very best for a bright and successful future.

Speaking of the Class of 2022, congratulations to John Flynn, our 2022 Michael H. Coleman Youth of the Year, and our other finalists who were awarded scholarships at our annual Awards & Recognition Dinner back in April. See Pages 4 and 5 for additional information on our Award Winners.

I recently attended the U.S. Conference of Mayors 90th Annual Meeting where many topics that effect cities and villages across the country were discussed. Facade Grants Now Available

Are you a business or commercial property owner? To encourage the improvement and revitalization of the exterior facades of existing commercial buildings, a Facade Grant program has been created for all eligible commercial properties in TIF Districts 3, 4, and 5:

- Up to 50% of eligible project costs will be reimbursed (up to \$25,000)
- Minimum project cost should be at least \$5,000
- Landscaping and/or streetscaping can be reimbursed up to 30%
- Applications and funding will be available on a first-come, first-served basis
- To be eligible, applicant and property owner must be in good standing with the Village

Eligible Improvements:

- Awnings & canopies
- Exterior walls/doors/windows/shutter/downspouts
- Exterior building materials
- Stairs, sidewalks, porches, railings, colonnades
- Signs (in conjunction with a comprehensive façade improvement project)
- Outdoor seating areas
- Landscaping
- Fencing
- Dumpster enclosure
- Screening of mechanical equipment/utilities at grade level or on the roof
- Code improvements

Keeping Our Town Looking Its Best

Spring is here and many residents are planning outdoor activities and addressing routine outdoor maintenance issues. Code Enforcement Officers will soon be in your neighborhood identifying issues that you may be planning to address.

As part of the Curb Appeal Program, when an officer observes a violation, they will typically notify the resident with a door hanger. The Officer will follow-up with a written notice of the violation to homeowner. Notices are not tickets, they are designed to identify what needs to be addressed within a specific time frame. If a homeowner needs more time to address an issue, they can contact the Code Enforcement Unit and speak with the case officer.



The following are some common items requiring correction:

- Tall grass and weeds over eight inches in height.
- Garbage and recycling containers improperly stored in front of the home.
- Driveways in serious disrepair.
- Missing or torn window screens.
- Rotted wood or peeling paint on the exterior.
- Fences that are in disrepair.
- Gutters and downspouts in disrepair.
- Inoperable vehicles stored in driveways
- Bare grass and ruts in lawn
- Dead or dangerous trees on the property.

2022 ANNUAL HYDRANT FLUSHING

The Village of Hanover Park's Public Works Department will begin the flushing of Village-owned fire hydrants starting Monday, August 29 through Tuesday, September 13. The flushing will occur between the hours of 6 a.m. and 2 p.m. Barricades will be placed in designated areas prior to flushing. Please do not wash laundry during the flushing hours as rust staining on clothing may result. Residents with water softeners are encouraged to check the cycle time of their softeners so that the unit does not regenerate during this period.

An important part of the water system maintenance program is annual flushing. The flushing not only ensures that the hydrant is working correctly and improves water flow, but also assists in improving water quality by removing unwanted minerals.

Hydrant flushing will take place in DuPage County as follows:

August 29, 30, 31, September 1

South of DuPage County Line, North of Stearns Road

September 6, 7, 8

South of Stearns Road, North of Schick Road

September 8, 9, 12, 13

South of Schick Road

Service Line Warranties of America (SLWA)

Almost ten years ago, Hanover Park began a partnership with Service Line Warranties of America (SLWA), a leading home service repair provider. Through this partnership, Hanover Park residents have an option to sign up for service plans to protect against the high cost of emergency repairs to their exterior water and sewer lines, as well as interior plumbing and drainage systems on their properties. Since the partnership began Hanover Park residents have signed up for almost 2,200 policies.

Service Line Warranties of America was part of HomeServe USA Corp (HomeServe), a provider of home repair solution services for over 3.1 million customers across the US and Canada. Recently, HomeServe received an offer from Brookfield, a global infrastructure company based in Canada, to acquire the entirety of the company. This transaction is expected to be completed around the fourth quarter of this year at the earliest.

Service Line Warranties of America has assured the Village that this announcement will not impact the service that they provide to our residents. Service Line Warranties of America will also be sending out a mailing to our residents explaining the transition to a new parent company.

The 2021 Consumer Confidence Water Quality Report

The Village of Hanover Park is dedicated to providing our residents with safe drinking water. As part of this effort, we have prepared the Consumer Confidence Report (CCR). This report is a requirement of the 1996 Safe Drinking Water Act amendments. It summarizes where your water came from, what it was made of, and how it compared to the standards established by regulatory agencies.

Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

- Microbial contaminants—viruses and bacteria which may come from septic systems, livestock, or wildlife.
- Inorganic contaminants – salts and metals which may be naturally-occurring or result from stormwater runoff, oil and gas production, mining, or farming.
- Pesticides and herbicides – these chemicals come from a variety of sources such as agriculture and residential uses.
- Organic chemical contaminants – by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production.
- Radioactive contaminants – can be naturally occurring or a result of oil and gas production.

One important item to realize is that these materials can be found throughout nature to some degree. Their presence does not necessarily mean that there is a health risk associated with our source water. The most important factor to consider is how much of the contaminant is found in the Village's water supply.

Hanover Park in the 2000s

In 2008, Hanover Park celebrated its fiftieth anniversary since its incorporation. The small village of 451 people had grown to a vibrant community of around 38,000. The Village continued to expand, with the intersection of Barrington Road and Lake Street broadening to six lanes. The Village got its first municipal fire department when it merged with the Hanover Park Fire Protection District in 2000, partly in thanks to the urging of Village President Irwin Bock. A new fire station was built on Barrington Road. The community also continued adapting to the digital age. In 2000, Hanover Park created its first village website to inform residents about community services and events.

The 2000s saw the passing of Village President Irwin Bock in 2003. He had served as village president since 1997 and as trustee for several terms before that. Former Village President Sonya Crawshaw passed in 2005. The Hanover Park branch of Poplar Creek Public Library was renamed for Sonya Crawshaw in 2006.

2022 Street Resurfacing & Water Main Improvement Projects

This year, the Village has two major construction projects that will include 12.6 miles of roadway improvements and 11,000 feet of water main replacement combined. The Village maintains a street condition rating system and uses that assessment and several other factors, including the age and condition of the underground utilities such as the water main, to select project locations and their limits. This year will be the largest roadway improvement project in the history of the Village. The projects will be paid for with funding from the Motor Fuel Tax, REBUILD Illinois Bond Funds, Water & Sewer Funds, and the State of Illinois Capital Grant.

For resurfacing, streets are selected based on their current condition, which is below the ideal minimum level of service, but not past the point where it would require complete reconstruction. The standard milling and resurfacing projects are a cost-effective remedy to bring the pavement back to a good condition. The scope of the project will include removal and replacement of the asphalt surface, bike path repairs, pavement patching, spot drainage improvements, curb & gutter removal & replacement, ADA sidewalk curb ramp improvements, and various pavement markings installation.

The Village understands that the work will be disruptive, and we appreciate your patience during this construction season. Construction notices will be mailed to impacted residents, and project updates will be posted on the Village's website. Residents are also encouraged to contact the Public Works Department at 630-823-5700 with any specific questions about the project.

Leave Fireworks to the Professionals

Fireworks are used to celebrate special events and holidays. Displays of large colors bursting in the sky have been enjoyed by many for hundreds of years.

Do you know what makes a firework explode? Ignited gunpowder creates heat and gas causing pressure to lift the firework shell up in the air. This reaction causes the explosion you see in the sky. Fireworks can be very dangerous. Therefore, it is safe to say that we should leave fireworks to those who are professionally trained.



According to the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), more than 19,500 fires annually have been caused by fireworks. Sparklers account

for roughly one-quarter of the emergency room firework injuries. A sparkler can reach a temperature of 1,200 °F. The NFPA provided some alternatives to using fireworks at your home.

- Use glow sticks, they glow in the dark and are a safe alternative to a sparkler. Fun for all ages.
- Loud and proud. Noise makers are sure to make a statement. They can be found at local party supply stores or make your own.
- Outdoor movie night. Set up a screen and projector. Don't forget the bug spray!
- Red, white, and blue silly string...fun for all ages.
- Make a patriotic craft with the family.
- Throw a birthday party for the USA, and don't forget the cake.

Pet Heat Safety in the Summer Months



Summer is a great time to practice heat safety for pets.

Excessive heat can cause serious medical emergencies in a very short amount of time. Everyone is at risk from the dangers of extreme heat, but some of us are affected more quickly, including pets.

Practice pet heat safety this summer and save a pet's life! Cracking windows in a hot car does not help keep your pets safe. The interior of a car can get dangerously hot within 10 minutes. Animals can die of a heatstroke within 15 minutes. During the hot weather, keep your pets at home. Call 911 if you see a pet in an unattended vehicle and do not leave until 911 arrives!

More tips for keeping your pet safe in the summer months include:

- Shade & Water - Protect your pets from the sun's rays and keep them hydrated
- No Asphalt - If it's too hot for bare feet, it's too hot for bare paws
- Limit Exercise - Don't let playful pets over-exert themselves in the heat
- Heat Stroke - Excessive panting, discolored gums and mobility problems are signs. Seek Veterinary attention immediately.

Lawn Irrigation Sprinklers and Backflow Preventers

Warmer weather is here, and residents will begin watering their lawns in hopes of bright green grass. If a resident utilizes a lawn irrigation system, the Illinois Plumbing Code requires that all sprinkler systems protect the public through the use of a properly installed cross-connection control device. These cross-connection control devices are

commonly referred to as backflow preventers or RPZ's.

Cross-connection control devices must be tested

and certified each year by a licensed plumber certified by the State as a cross-connection control device inspector. The Public Works Department monitors the annual certification of these devices. The Village Code requires that a copy of the annual test be submitted to Aqua Backflow at www.trackmybackflow.com. For more information on cross-connection control in the Village, call the Public Works Department at (630) 823-5700.

Floor Drain Maintenance - Fill Traps Often

Floor drains are commonly found in basement floors, garages, and laundry rooms inside your home. They are installed anywhere where fast, efficient water drainage is needed.

The traps in floor drains need regular maintenance. The purpose of traps is to prevent sewer odors and gasses from making their way through the drain and into your home.

The traps in floor drains or for that matter, any drains that haven't been used often, will eventually dry out. A dry trap can cause a room to fill with sewer gas from the Village's sewer system and cause a strong odor.

Make sure to fill these traps regularly to ensure they're working as they should and to form a barrier between your home and your sewer system.

Simply pour some fresh water down each floor drain in your home. A simple step that will prevent an unpleasant smell from entering your home.

Mosquito Management

Summer means backyard barbecues, sunshine and those dreaded mosquitoes making an appearance. The Village of Hanover Park has begun its annual efforts to minimize mosquito populations, reduce the risk of West Nile Virus transmission, and preserve the overall comfort and quality of life for our residents.

The Village has contracted with St. Charles-based Clarke to provide our community located in Bloomingdale and Wayne Townships (DuPage County) with an integrated mosquito management program. Our community located in Schaumburg and Hanover Townships (Cook County) will have their service provided by Northwest Mosquito Abatement District (NWMAD).

While Clarke and NWMAD have the responsibility to address mosquitoes throughout the region, there are several things that residents can do to help control mosquitoes. Here are a few ideas that local property owners can do:

Tips for Removing Mosquito Breeding Sites Around the Home

1. Remove artificial ponds or aerate the water.
2. Maintain clean fresh water in bird baths.
3. Clean the gutters. Clogged gutters are ideal places for hatching mosquitoes.
4. Properly dispose of used tires.
5. Remove standing water. Once a week dump or drain wheelbarrows and pots.
6. Clean swimming pools regularly and remove covers with standing water.
7. Spreading coffee grounds and tea waste throughout the yard won't keep you from being bitten, but studies have shown that they limit the reproduction of mosquitoes.
8. Keep your grass cut and your yard free of leaf litter.

Mosquito Control Products for Residents

1. Yard foggers and insect sprays.
2. Personal spray repellents such as DEET and Picaridin.
3. The American Mosquito Control Association (AMCA) recommends using a large oscillating fan to keep your deck mosquito-free.
