Youth Scholarship Program





The Clerk's Office has a youth scholarship program to assist families who are in financial need. This program helps the youth of Hanover Park participate in extra curricular activities in our community.

The Village of Hanover Park will provide financial assistance to those residents who meet the eligibility requirements. The Clerk's Office will approve \$75.00 per child/per calendar year. Financial Assistance funds can be utilized for Park District classes and camps, Gymkhana, A & A Music & Art Academy, baseball and Hurricanes Football & Cheer association. Other options may be available. Please contact the clerk's office to inquire.

Eligibility Requirements:


1. Must be a resident of Hanover Park
2. Must demonstrate financial need
3. May be used for Park District classes and camps, Gymkhana, and Hurricanes Football & Cheer association. Must bring in program guide with class information (dates, times, and pricing)
4. May submit only one application per child living in the household per calendar year and receive up to \$75 toward the program or class.

Michael H. Coleman Youth of the Year Award

Students are evaluated on academic, career, leadership and community initiative. Each year, a high school senior is selected as the Hanover Park "Youth of the Year." Arlington Drive Bridge Replacement Update

Bridge replacement projects are expensive and require a lot of design and planning. Almost a decade ago, the Village first started working to secure funding for the replacement of the Arlington Drive Bridge over the West Branch of the DuPage River. In 2015, the Village secured funding and began working with IDOT to replace the bridge. Over the last few years, the Village has been working on the design and has secured the necessary easements to complete the work from the adjacent property owners. Due to the nature of the project and the funding, the contract for the construction must be bid through IDOT. The Village anticipates this occurring in Spring 2024. Construction is expected to take approximately a year to complete. As a reminder, the bridge is weight restricted to 5 tons total weight, so buses, trucks, and other large vehicles are not to use the bridge!

Upcoming Water Rate, Sewer Rate, and Infrastructure Service Charge Increase

On December 1, 2022, the Village Board approved a 5-year Water Rate increase, a Sewer Rate increase, and a change to the Infrastructure Service Charge.

Effective January 1st, 2024, with the bill due January 21st, an increase will take place to the water rate, sewer rate and infrastructure service charge.

These increases are crucial for the Village to continue providing high-quality water services, ensuring the upkeep of infrastructure, and meeting the demands of our growing community. The adjustments have been carefully considered, keeping in mind both the sustainability of our water resources and the financial implications for our residents.

Current Rates:

- Water Rate: \$9.77 per Tgal
- Cook County Sewer Rate: \$2.16 per Tgal
- DuPage County Sewer Rate: \$5.82 per Tgal

Infrastructure Service Charge (Based on Meter Size):

- $\frac{3}{4}$ -inch meter and less: \$19.98/month
- 1-inch meter: \$35.56/month
- 1.5-inch meter: \$79.92/month
- 2-inch meter: \$142.06/month
- 3-inch meter: \$319.68/month
- 4-inch meter: \$568.23/month
- Discounted rate for $\frac{3}{4}$ -inch meter and less: \$6.75/month

New Rates Effective January 1st, 2024:

- Water Rate: \$10.21 per Tgal
- Cook County Sewer Rate: \$2.26 per Tgal
- DuPage County Sewer Rate: \$6.08 per Tgal

Infrastructure Service Charge (Based on Meter Size):

- $\frac{3}{4}$ -inch meter and less: \$21.58/month
- 1-inch meter: \$38.41/month
- 1.5-inch meter: \$86.31/month

WATER USE SURVEY

The Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (IEPA) requires every water supply provider to develop and implement a backflow prevention control program. The program mandates surveying all water customers every three years to identify and eliminate connections that could allow contaminants to accidentally flow back into the drinking water from sources such as fire protection sprinkler systems, boilers, lawn sprinklers and some swimming pools.

The Village of Hanover Park's Water Division is responsible for maintaining the Village's water distribution system by providing all water supply users with water that is safe, clean and adequate in quantity and quality.

A cross-connection is a connection between a drinking water supply and a non-drinking water source, where a contaminant could potentially enter the drinking water supply. Cross-connections should be protected by a valve called a backflow preventer. A backflow preventer is simply a device that allows the water to only flow in one direction. Property owners are responsible for installing, annual testing, and maintaining backflow preventers if they meet the criteria to require a backflow prevention device.

Hanover Park water customers will receive a survey in the mail. There is no cost, and it takes only a few moments to complete. Surveys should be completed within 30 days of receipt of the notice.

Home Construction in Hanover Park's Early Years

After Hanover Park was incorporated as a village in 1958, the Village began in earnest to change from rural to more suburban. Developers realized they could build homes faster and cheaper by developing multiple model homes on large tracts of farmland, rather than individuals purchasing a personal lot and finding a builder to construct their home on it.

Many of Hanover Park's farms soon became subdivisions. Grants Highway Subdivision, first built in 1925, was greatly expanded in the 1950s. Hanover Park First Addition, with some of its first houses on Evergreen Avenue near Barrington Road, Hanover Park Estates, Hanover Highlands, and Hanover Gardens opened to residents during the first half of the 1960s.

If you are interested in helping preserve Hanover Park history, the Hanover Park Historic Committee meets at Village Hall every fourth Tuesday of the month. You can learn more about Hanover Park history--and learn about recording an oral history with us!--at Poplar Creek Public Library's Digital History Collection at pclib.org/localhistory, which shares images provided by the Historic Committee. Keep the Wreath Red

The Hanover Park Fire Department will once again be participating in the Illinois Fire Chiefs Association "Keep the Wreath Red" campaign.

Both Hanover Park fire stations will be displaying a wreath wrapped in red lights, on the front of their buildings. The lights remain lit on these wreaths twenty-four hours a day during the holiday season. Should a fire occur that is determined to be the result of a holiday decoration, a white bulb replaces a red bulb on the wreath.

These wreaths are a challenge to Hanover Park residents to keep the lights on the wreath red and to alert people of the dangers associated with holiday decorations catching fire. The wreath campaign provides a visual reminder to everyone that the happiness of the holiday season can be changed in an instant by a fire. The department urges residents to enjoy this special time of year but remember common sense and awareness of fire threats.



The Hanover Park Fire Department recommends these tips to help ensure a fun and safe holiday season:

- Homeowners are responsible for removing snow from their walks and provide a level and unobstructed walkway within 24 hours after two inches or more of snowfall.

Bring in your entire strands, including lights that no longer work, to the Hanover Park Public Works Department, Monday through Friday, 8:00 a.m.-3:30 p.m. A container will be placed outside the building for collection.

No Yard Waste Sticker Needed for November's Leaves
