Understanding Special Event & Block Party Applications in Hanover Park

Did you know that if you are planning a Special Event or Block Party, you will need to complete the proper application? What is the difference between the two you ask?

Block Parties are for Hanover Park residents who live on a residential street and wish to have a party with their neighbors. Streets may be closed (if available and approved). All applications for a Block party should be submitted to the Clerk's office 30 days prior to the party. There are no fees associated with a block party application.

Special Events are for businesses in Hanover Park to promote business through sidewalk sales, live entertainment, festivals, and more. These events require a Village permit submitted 60 days prior to the event. The fee for each special event permit is \$35.00.

Garage Sale: There is NO permit needed for Garage Sales. We ask that you adhere to our sign regulation if you choose do a garage sale. Signs may be erected one day in advance of the sale and must be removed at end of the sale. Banners are prohibited. Illegal signs will be removed and disposed of by Village personnel. Property owners may receive citations based upon repeat offenses.

The Hanover Park Fire Department was originally founded in 1928 as the Ontarioville Fire Protection District. The department has grown from a firefighter pulled 60-gallon two wheeled soda acid cart stored in a warehouse, to providing emergency responses with staffed ambulances and suppression units, public education, emergency management and preparedness, on-scene rehabilitation to firefighters by volunteer Fire Corp members, and providing permits and inspections by the Inspectional Services Division.

Currently, the department operates out of two fire stations that are strategically located to provide timely responses and coverage to the Village. The department responds to a variety of emergencies, including but not limited to structure fires, hazardous materials incidents, vehicle accidents and medical emergencies. The department staffs 11 personnel each shift to provide emergency responses with a rescue squad, fire engine, tower ladder, two ambulances, and a shift commander 24 hours per day, 365 days a year.

Additionally, the department provides public education and safety programs, such as smoke detector installations and school safety talks. The department also provides Emergency Management for the Village. All of which promote safety and preparedness for the community.

The department is a member of the West Suburban Fire Rescue Alliance with 7 other neighboring fire departments and protection districts. The primary objective of the Alliance is to standardize operations and training. This is done through monthly training sessions and planning to ensure agencies operate collaboratively and safely at emergency incidents.

With an emphasis on continuous training and development, firefighters constantly undergo a variety of different types of training environments including paramedic continuing education, live fire training, active threat, and disaster responses to ensure that department personnel are ready to handle any situation.

Fire Corp personnel are a group of volunteer members of the department that respond to structure fires and other large emergency incidents to provide on-scene rehabilitation to firefighters. Fire Corp has a response vehicle called Rehab 15, equipped with water, Gatorade, cooling chairs and other items to help firefighters rehab after fighting fires or working at large scale incidents.


Outside of emergency responses and preparedness, the Fire Department Inspectional Services Division protects public health and safety by providing periodic inspections of all businesses in the Village. In addition, Inspectional Services reviews all construction projects, issues permit and provides inspections for food services in the Village. The Inspectional Services Division operates at Village Hall and is staffed by a Chief Building Inspector, Project/Plan Reviewer, 2 inspectors, and 3 permit coordinators.

WaterSmart is Here!

Residents now have access to a new utility portal called WaterSmart. Through the WaterSmart portal, residents can track their own water usage history with personalized recommendations on how to reduce water consumption. You can enroll in usage alerts that will notify you of any unusual spikes in water use. This feature helps you detect issues early and avoid unexpected high bills!



Residents will also be able to view and pay their utility bills through the WaterSmart portal. Options for paperless billing and autopay are also available! You can look up your account by providing your utility account number and zip code. From there, you will create an account by providing your email and create a password.

How Can WaterSmart Help Me Detect A Leak?

Through the WaterSmart portal, you can enroll in high or unplanned use notifications. You choose the parameters and how you would like to be notified, such as email, text message, or voice message. Unexplained high usage is often a sign of a leak. WaterSmart provides a step-by-step guidance on where to check for leaks,

including your toilet, faucets, and irrigation systems. This guidance includes videos on where and how to look for potential leaks. You can submit this found leak information in WaterSmart to help you better track and understand your water consumption. If you find a leak and are unsure how to fix it, remember to contact a plumber for further assistance.

A Brief History of the Hanover Park Women's Club

The Hanover Park Junior Women's Club began in 1966. One of their first events was a Christmas party for children that was attended by over 400 people. You might remember participating in their Christmas parties, or some of their other community activities and events: blood draws, senior lunches, donating toys and food baskets, Halloween parties, environmental projects, a child fingerprinting and videotaping program run with the police department, a baby picture contest, and their annual fashion show. The club had over 3,000 hours of community service from 1985 to 1986. The club ended in the 1990s.

Beware of Ruse Burglaries

Ruse burglaries or distraction burglaries are crimes where a criminal pretends to be someone else to gain entry into a home and steal valuables. To prevent ruse burglaries you can:

- Be wary of strangers: Don't open the door to people you don't know or who you haven't called for service.
- Verify identity: Ask for identification before allowing anyone into your home.
- Report suspicious activity: Call 911 immediately if you see someone or something suspicious.
- Secure your home: Install deadbolt locks on all exterior doors, and additional locks on sliding glass doors and windows.
- Make your home look occupied: Keep lights on and arrange for lawn care and mail pickup while you're away.
- Educate your neighbors: Share information about ruse burglaries with your neighbors and relatives.
- Be alert: Look out for suspicious vehicles or activity and be especially watchful of elderly neighbors.



Examples of ruse burglaries include:

- A con artist approaches a victim in their yard and distracts them
- A repair person claims to need to enter the home to complete a repair
- A utility worker claims to need to check for a gas, electric, or water problem
- A fire department inspector claims to need to check smoke detectors

When in doubt, do not let the individual inside. Call 911 and an officer will respond to your location to provide assistance.

Tips for a Healthy Lawn

Weeds

The Code Enforcement Unit would like to remind residents that local ordinance prohibits weeds, grass, or plants (except ornamental trees, bushes, or flowers) to exceed eight inches in height.

Follow these tips to keep your lawn healthy:

- Trim and edge the grass before mowing to reduce the risk of injury and improve the appearance of your lawn.

- Mow often and early, preferably in the morning or evening, to maintain a healthy lawn and avoid stressing the grass.
- Cut your lawn "tall", leaving about 3 inches of grass height, to promote root growth and prevent weeds.
- Let the grass clippings fall and mulch the grass blades finer, to provide nutrients and moisture to the soil.
- Finish by blowing or sweeping up lawn waste on driveways and

sidewalks. Unattended lawn waste and clog storm drains or make its way to local waterways.

- Maintain your mower by regularly checking the oil and cleaning the mower deck.
- Use a sharp mower blade and change direction each time you mow, to make a clean cut and prevent soil compaction.

She currently serves as the Board Liaison for the Village's Environmental Committee, and the DuPage Mayors and Managers Conference Legislative Committee. She is also the Economic Development Chair for the DuPage County NAACP, and is a Board Member of the

Jenni Broccolino is a newly elected Village Trustee who is actively involved as PTA Treasurer. She also serves as a Girl Scout Leader and is actively involved as a community leader with Mission Church.

Red Flag Warnings...What it Means!

This spring has been a busy season with high winds adding to potential brush fires for Hanover Park. Our residents can help protect our neighbors from brush fires by being weather aware of Red Flag Warnings.

Do you know what Red Flag Warning means?

A Red Flag Warning means that the weather conditions are present for wildland fire combustion and the rapid spread of fire. We typically do not see these warnings in our suburban area, but as weather conditions change between seasons, our levels of humidity and high winds can create these conditions more frequently. The National Weather Service will designate a Red Flag Watch or Red Flag Warning when weather conditions include high winds, low humidity combined with dry or dead vegetation.

Fire Chief Eric Fors recommends to remain Weather Aware of any notifications from the National Weather Service on Red Flag Warnings. The use of any charcoal grills, outdoor fire pits, burn pits, or approved seasonal firewood burning should be delayed due to the risk of flying embers. These embers could cause a rapid spread of fire within our residential area during Red Flag conditions. He also suggests using caution when discarding smoking materials and storing hot operating equipment that could cause fires quickly.

What is a Prescribed Burn?

The Village of Hanover Park Fire Department does not participate in Prescribed Burns to burn dead foliage in a controlled manor within our village, but you may see contractors from DuPage County complete these for environmental purposes.

How can I become Weather Aware?

The National Weather Service – Chicago office provides updates on current weather conditions and outlooks that impact the Village of Hanover Park. Check out their website at www.weather.gov/lot for current conditions and warnings for our area.



Arlington Drive Bridge Project: Enhancing Our Community!



The Village of Hanover Park is excited to announce that the Arlington Drive Bridge Replacement project began this spring. This essential infrastructure upgrade, made possible by over a decade of planning and funding efforts, will significantly improve safety and accessibility in our community. Those efforts have resulted in the Illinois Department of Transportation funding 80% of the \$2.3 million project.

Preparatory work, including layout, traffic control, and utility relocation, began in April. The bridge replacement will require the complete closure of Arlington Drive between Greenbrook Boulevard and Catalina Drive for most of the project. Clearly marked detours will direct traffic exiting the neighborhood to Lake Street via Arlington Drive, and entering via Greenbrook Boulevard to Lake Street to Arlington Drive. Construction is highly dependent on weather conditions but is anticipated to take until the spring of 2026. The bridge will be closed for most of 2025.

Storm Drains and Urban Runoff Pollution

Anything that residents or businesses use in their daily activities can end up in the street. The smallest amount of rain can carry these hazardous materials through the storm drain, polluting streams, rivers, and wetlands. The main reason for storm drains is to clear the water from the streets and not to dispose of hazardous materials.

Dumping one quart of motor oil down a storm drain contaminates 250,000 gallons of water. Storm drains are separate from the Village's sewer system, which can cause urban runoff pollution to flow into streams and rivers, harming aquatic life and wetland habitats.

Urban runoff pollution can include anything that washes into the storm drain from the community. This includes:

- Automotive leaks and spills
- Pesticides, herbicides, and fertilizers from lawns and gardens
- Cleaners and paint
- Debris from landscaping and construction projects


